We currently do not have the faculty to accomplish both the seat-based sections and online sections necessary to accomplish this endeavor. John Matchulat and Mike Burnette, CJ Instructors, have offered a total of four (4) online classes during Fall 2004 and Spring 2005. The student count served for these four classes was 54.

A Forensics Certificate will be indicated as part of this program with the intended starting semester being Fall 2005. The Forensic Certificate will allow students to accomplish 15 – 18 semester hours of specialized training and credit in the study of Forensics.

Of these graduates (2) 100% indicated either a satisfied or very satisfied rating for the quality of the program area courses and the quality of the academic program. Based upon these limited results, we have accomplished our goal.
