The other critical component to reaching this historic milestone will be support from you!


As current SCC student and Student Success Scholarship recipient Dominic Caprita says, "Without scholarship assistance, I would not be able to continue my education."

Faculty perspective

Danell Moses, dean of career technologies

Danell Moses is the dean of the career technologies division at SCC. She recently shared some thoughts about the impact that the SCC Foundation scholarships have on students' lives here in our community.

"I have had many students who faced situations where they had to decide to go back to work full time because the cost of school was too burdensome," Danell says. She points out people may often think of the average college student as a "fresh-faced, recent high school graduate who lives at home," but that is not always the case at SCC. "We have students from all walks of life, those with families who support them and those whose families depend on them for support. Foundation Scholarships can assist anyone!"

Danell describes a student she had in class who received a scholarship from the Foundation. "He was an older student who had a family. He told me the scholarship money offset the costs of tuition and textbooks which in turn helped him to better provide for his family."
