Students Who are Academically Under-Prepared: No High School Diploma or Developmental Placement:

SCC: Literacy Program: ABE/GED/ESL (Debbie Smith, 339-4361). Consider placement and course load. Curriculum advisors, LAC, tutoring, SSS, career services, schedule time to receive all services.

Students Who are Single Parents or Caring for Children at Home:

SCC: Time management, attendance policies, faculty and advisors, scheduling, on-line classes.
