

More than 50 Honored at SCC's Adult High School Graduation Ceremony

nstructor Cynthia Burke clearly remembers when
Crystal Yanez started working toward her High School
Equivalency through Southwestern Community
College's Educational Opportunities department.

"Crystal was raising two children of her own, and she also cared for her sister's two children," Burke recalled recently. "Even with all that, she was conscientious about coming to class. She was essentially raising four kids, and there were times she had to put them first. But she would always get her work done from home."

Yanez had grown up in Sylva and attended Jackson County Public Schools until her junior year in high school, when she dropped out after getting pregnant.

Eager to change her circumstance, though, she enrolled in SCC's High School Equivalency preparation courses in the fall of 2014. She took some college classes for free through SCC's Basic Skills Plus and had several hours of college credit by the time she earned her High School Equivalency and Adult High School Diploma in May of 2015.

She's now pursuing her associate degree in human services technology at Southwestern and served as the student speaker at the college's Adult High School graduation on June 8 at the Jackson Campus.

"Time has been the biggest challenge for me," said Yanez, whose children are now four and eight years old. "I've had to manage my time wisely. I stay up late to get my studies done, and I have to find time for my kids too. It's not easy to arrange childcare and make time

for studies, but it can be done.

"It's not about where you have been or your background; it's about where you're going," Yanez added. "With hard work and dedication, anything is possible."

Yanez was among more than 50 graduates honored during the ceremony.

Alarm System Installation

MNT-3200 Alarm System Installation: (144 Hours): This course introduces the student to the operation and skill standards for the alarm industry. Topics focus on the basics in electrical theory and application, schematic reading, test equipment, standards, calculations, installation, programming, maintenance and repair of alarm system wiring and equipment per applicable code, implementation of logical testing procedure for identifying system faults, and understanding general building construction. Upon completion, the student will have the knowledge to sit for a national certification exam as an Alarm Security Technician. (National Institute for Certification in Engineering Technologies-Fire Alarm Systems Certification, Level I-Students will be responsible for scheduling and sitting for exam. ONLINE OCCUPATIONAL TRAINING COURSES

Classes start 1st Tuesday of Each Month 9/6, 10/4, 11/1, 12/6. Registration Fee: \$180 + \$5 Technology Fee
Students must register five business days before the start date of the class.

CET 3100- Online Computer Technician: (288 hrs.) This 16-week course is specifically designed to prepare students for the CompTIA A+ certification exams. Students learn about hardware, operating systems, networking, security, and troubleshooting as well as more specialized topics such as mobile devices, laptops, and printers. In addition to one-on-one support from experienced instructors throughout the course and access to personalized graduate support after course completion, students receive two quick-reference exam study guides, a computer repair toolkit, a power supply tester, a USB drive and two CompTIA A+ certification exam vouchers.

MED 3300-Online Electronic Health Records Office Professional: (285 hrs.) Train for a new career as an Electronic Health Records Office Professional! In this career, individuals play an integral role in the daily operations of physician's offices and hospitals. Throughout this 15-week course, students will learn Microsoft Office basics, healthcare documentation and reimbursement, practice finances, and standard office procedures. In addition, students will be focusing heavily on a vital component of the medical field-electronic health records. Students will complete interactive course modules that include over 20 hours of training on the industry-standard ezEMRx EHR software. Upon completion of the Electronic Health Records Office Professional program students will be prepared for the Certified Medical Administrative Assistant (CMAA) and Certified Electronic Health Records Specialist (CEHRS) certification exams.

MED 3300-Online Professional Medical Coding and Billing with Applied PCS Part 1: (320 hrs.) The AHIMA-approved Professional Medical Coding and Billing with Applied PCS program is a two part course that prepares students for the Certified Coding Associate (CCA) and Certified Professional Coder (CPC) certification exams. This 20 week course will include healthcare information management, reimbursement methodologies, biomedical sciences, and an introduction to coding. In addition to one-on-one support from experienced instructors during training and access to personalized graduate support, students receive e-books, industry codebooks and access to online references.

MED 3300-Online Professional Medical Coding and Billing with Applied PCS Part 2: (320 hrs.)

Complete the Medical Coding and Billing with Applied PCS program. This 20-week course is a continuation of Part 1 and will include legal compliance, CPT/HCPCS Coding, Advanced ICD-10 Coding, Advanced Anatomy & Physiology, and Exam Prep. Students practice their coding skills in an extensive practical section to gain valuable hands-on experience before graduation. In addition to one-on-one support from experienced instructors during training and access to personalized graduate support, students receive e-books, industry codebooks and access to online references.

MED 3300-Online Medical Transcription Editor Part I: (320 hrs.)

Learn from home at the convenience of your computer! This 16-week course is the first course in a two-part program designed to teach the student to transfer audio-recorded dictation into hard copy medical documents. The student also will gain the knowledge and skills of speech recognition editing, which will help them produce medical doc-

uments that are used by physicians, medical personnel, and courts of law on a daily basis. Online reference materials, student and technical support, and a one-year help hotline are included in this course offered by SCC in partnership with Career Step.

MED 3300-Online Medical Transcription Editor Part II: (320 hrs.) Complete the medical transcription editor program! This 16-week course is the second in a two-part program designed to teach the student to transfer audio-recorded dictation into hard copy medical documents. The student also will gain the knowledge and skills of speech recognition editing, which will help them produce medical documents that are used by physicians, medical personnel, and courts of law on a daily basis. Online reference materials, student and technical support, personal employment consultations, contracts and pricing guide, referral letters, résumé examples, and a one-year help hotline are included in this course offered by SCC in partnership with Career Step. PREREQ-UISITES: A student must complete Part I to be able to register.

OSC 3609-Online Pharmacy Technician-Health Care Unit/Retail Training: (264 hrs.) This 13-week course provides curriculum that will prepare a student to find employment (and success) as a pharmacy technician in the health care or retail setting. Emphasis is placed on a variety of duties within the pharmacy environment including: computer fundamentals, keyboard kinetics, patient records, communication, receptionist duties as they apply to the hospital and retail settings, clerical duties, math concepts, pharmacology, pharmacy law, regulations, standards, calculations, clerical duties, preparing for the workforce, non-sterile compounding, and preparation for a final exam that also serves as an opportunity for students to determine their readiness for the Pharmacy Technician Certification Board (PTCB) exam. An externship built into the program allows students to optimize their learning experiences in this course.

HEALTH CARE PROFESSIONS

NUR-3240-Nursing Assistant I: The graduate of the Nurse Aide I training program is eligible to sit for the North Carolina State competency exam. The cost of the exam is \$101, which will be payable to Pearson Vue. After successful completion of the state exam, graduates will be registered on the North Carolina Nurse Aide Registry through the NC Division of Health Service Regulation. The cost of the class (\$226) includes the registration fee, malpractice insurance, accident insurance, and student identification. 



The Jerry Sutton Public Safety Training Center (PSTC) is a division of Southwestern Community College (SCC). SCC-PSTC is located within the Macon County Industrial Park, on Highway 64-West. Advanced Emergency Medical Technicians function as part of a comprehensive EMS response, under medical oversight. Advanced Emergency Medical Technicians perform interventions with the basic and advanced equipment typically found on an ambulance. The Advanced Emergency Medical Technician is a link from the scene to the emergency health care system. This class consists of 184 hours didactic education, clinical education of 48 hours in the hospital emergency department and 48 hours of field internship at area EMS agencies and 12 hours of final comprehensive practical evaluation. BLS for Healthcare Providers: This course is for healthcare professionals who need to know how to perform CPR, as well as other lifesaving skills, in a wide variety of in-hospital and out-of-hospital settings. Call for more information. SCC-PSTC TBA

This individual possesses the basic knowledge and skills necessary to provide lifesaving interventions while awaiting additional EMS response and to assist higher level personnel at the scene and during transport. Emergency Medical Responders function as part of a comprehensive EMS response, under medical oversight. Emergency Medical Responders perform basic interventions with minimal equipment. Emergency Medical Technician - Hybrid Course: The primary focus of the Emergency Medical Technician is to provide basic emergency medical care and transportation for critical and emergent patients who access the emergency medical system. Emergency Medical Technicians function as part of a comprehensive EMS response, under medical oversight. Emergency Medical Technicians perform interventions with the basic equipment typically found on an ambulance. The Emergency Medical Technician is a link from the scene to the emergency health care system. FIRE AND RESCUE

Various courses are offered in cooperation with individual fire and rescue departments in the Jackson County, Macon County, Swain County and Qualla Boundary service area. Specific courses are designed to increase the firefighter's technical knowledge and improve his or her skills in fire ground operation. Classes may be offered according to the needs of each fire department. In addition, SCC offers the nationally recognized firefighter certification program and the rescue certification program. The training curriculum is based on the NFPA 1001 & NFPA 1006 standards.

The Fire and Rescue Training Facility is located adjacent to the Public Safety Training Complex at 225 Industrial Park Loop, Franklin, NC 28734. This 4,100 square foot, three-story live burn building is designated for a variety of training exercises. Both fire and smoke exercises can be conducted in and on the structure and rescue operations can be simulated throughout the building. SCC will coordinate training for firefighters and rescue personnel in the region and will be responsible for the scheduling of this facility.

CJC-5020: Subject Control/Arrest Techniques (SC/AT) Workshop Series (Either 08 or 10 Hrs.): This workshop series will review and expand basic, practical and effective subject control/arrest principles and techniques for resisting and combative behaviors encountered by the law enforcement professional, built upon the foundation of the North Carolina - Basic Law Enforcement Training (NC-BLET) SC/AT curriculum. Attendees should be sworn law enforcement officers, employed by a Police Department, Sheriff's Office or state agency within North Carolina. CJC-5020: 5020: Specialty Munitions Refresher: (08 hrs.) This course facilitates the occupational recertification process of sworn law enforcement officers who require specialized training in the procurement, storage, transportation and deployment of Impact and Chemical Munitions, Flash-Bang & Sting-Ball Munitions and Oleoresin Capsicum Aerosol Delivery systems during tactical operations. Consideration of legal, liability, safety and mitigation of potential risks/hazards associated with their deployment will be reviewed and discussed, guided by the attendee's agency-specific policy and procedures, rules & regulations, as well as established manufacturer recommendations and training standards. The course will consist of lecture, demonstration laboratory and practical exercise stressing individual Operator, as well as Team capabilities, required for successful deployment of these munitions during the resolution of critical incidents. Upon completion of this course, attendees will be better prepared to consider the risk verses benefit options related to the deployment of specialty munitions during tactical operations within their specific jurisdictions. Attendees must be sworn law enforcement officers requiring on-going and continuous training within the area of specialty munitions. Attendees will wear appropriate attire and footwear conducive to the execution of tactical operations, inclusive of agency-issued/personally-owned personal protective equipment (PPE), including but not limited to: air purifying respirator (APR), ballistic helmet, eye protection, hearing protection, gloves, ballistic vests and mission-specific load-out gear required by Team assignment/ position.
