As a minority, low-income student, I knew the only way for me to accomplish that goal was through education. Along with striving to make good grades, I also knew to complete community service and participate in any extracurricular activities that interested me. Although none of this I could have achieved on my own; I regularly attended Upward Bound summer institutes, meetings and scheduled extra time to meet with Upward Bound staff. Despite all the times I wanted to give up because the work was stressful, I kept telling myself it would all be worth it in the end.

During my senior year I applied to 15 different schools and numerous scholarships ('cause hey, free money). By second semester, I had narrowed it down to two possible candidates: North Carolina State University and the University of Miami. After visiting both schools and considering where I wanted to live for the next four years, I received my financial aid packages which included school-specific scholarship offers. Now came the hard part. I had to make the decision by myself of which school to attend.

If attending NC State, I would have a full ride and potentially be paid to go to school; if attending UM I would have to cover some of the cost associated with room, board and travel expenses (as a Hammond Scholar, my tuition was covered). After visiting UM's campus I basically fell in love and I was determined to attend this school. They met, and exceeded, all of my criteria which included ethnic diversity, good academic programs, and strong support systems. When visiting NC State's campus I didn't have my "falling in love moment", but for me, money talks and a full ride was really enticing. I struggled to come up with a solid decision. I felt bad for turning down either school because of the amount of money they were willing to give me to have me attend. Ultimately, I decided to attend the University of Miami because I felt it was a better fit for me and overall I would be happier. Making this decision wasn't easy and brought me to tears on numerous occasions, but now I am so excited knowing I am moving to Miami in a couple of \leq months.


