What a busy semester! As of November 15th, 169 tutoring relationships were established and tutors reported 1,169 hours assisting students. The Tutor Program's cumulative success rate remains high at 80.8 percent. Student achievement and the overall success of the Tutor Program are due, in part, to your diligence and dedication as an SCC tutor.

You not only assist students but strive to gain the necessary skills to be an effective tutor. You attend training workshops and required meetings. This semester, you, along with your fellow tutors, were engaged in a collective total of 145 hours of training workshops and tutor meetings. During these tutor meetings I listened as you discussed the techniques you use in your sessions. I was delighted to hear you are using many of the strategies presented in the training workshops. You offer an active learning environment to engage your students, you create a variety of problems to help your students master specific concepts, and you provide an opportunity for your students to develop problem solving and critical thinking skills.

Many of you meet with instructors and/or "sit in" on one of the courses you tutor. You view training DVDs to learn the best practices in assisting students. You go that extra mile, putting in many more hours than you are compensated—previewing course material, completing the necessary monthly paperwork, or talking with your students in the evenings or on weekends to assist with a concept they find challenging.

When I visit the Tutor Room in Oaks Hall there are times when it is "alive" with learning. I witness students at the white board working through mathematics or physics problems. There are bones on the floor as students learn their respective names and placement for Anatomy and Physiology courses. Computers are on as students and tutors discuss programming or coding concepts. It is apparent you are a positive role model and engage students in the learning process. You create a safe, positive, and thought-provoking intellectual environment. Your patience and encouragement make a huge difference in a student's desire to achieve. It is certainly evident that what you learn in training seminars and through personal research influences how you tutor your students. Hopefully, students will apply many of these strategies, not only during their academic tenure, but in their eventual careers.

The outstanding assistance you provide, along with the outcomes the program achieves, are just some of the reasons why SCC faculty continue to recommend students to this Program. Your dedication to the students you assist and your determination to become an effective tutor do not go unnoticed. **YOU** are what makes SCC's Tutor Program an excellent academic resource for students and a successful community of learning.
