

### SCC Foundation's fourth annual gala to be held Sept. 16

This year, Southwestern Community College leaders aren't just planning another gala.

They're hoping for a million-dollar celebration.

The Southwestern Community College Foundation will hold its annual "Bluegrass, Blue Jeans & Bling" gala at 6 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 16, at Harrah's Cherokee Casino Resort just as the Student Success Campaign nears the completion of its "March to a Million" fundraising effort.

The campaign is less than \$53,000 shy of establishing the first \$1 million scholarship endowment in SCC's history. With enough support, the gala could push the campaign past the seven-figure mark.

"I am thrilled we are so close to reaching this historic goal," said Brett Woods, SCC Foundation director. "I am grateful to the many generous friends of SCC who have chosen to support our students through the Student Success Campaign. We hope everyone who's contributed to this effort – along with anyone who's been wanting to – will join us and ensure we get to celebrate on this special night."

This is the fourth straight year the SCC Foundation has held a gala in an effort to close the wide gap between the number of students that qualify for scholarships and the actual number of students that receive scholarships each year.

For the 2017-2018 academic year, 284 students applied for scholarships. SCC only had the resources available to award 69.

"Every year, our students amaze us with their work ethic, creativity and academic excellence,"

said Dr. Don Tomas, SCC president. "We are excited about the prospect of helping more students than ever before, and our annual gala has a lot to do with making that happen."

Frogtown will provide the bluegrass music for the evening, and classics singer Steve Johannessen will perform as well. There will also be a wine pull, silent auction, cornhole and a best dressed "Blue Jeans and Bling" contest along with the meal prepared by the chefs of Harrah's Cherokee Casino Resort.

Tickets are \$150 each, and table sponsorships begin at \$1,500.

# Two SCC employees support future students through estate gifts

The 1964 Society, named in tribute of the year Southwestern Community College was founded, is an honorary society that recognizes and honors alumni and friends who have provided legacy gifts. Types of gifts include: making provisions for the Southwestern Community College Foundation (SCCF) in their will, naming SCCF as an owner and/or beneficiary of a full life insurance policy, establishing a charitable trust for the benefit of the SCC Foundation, or naming Southwestern Community College Foundation as a beneficiary in their retirement plan.

We don't usually like to brag, but the faculty and staff members of SCC are some of the most generous and inspiring people around. Just this year, two employees committed to providing estate gifts to ensure their generosity lives on long after them. While one donor wished to remain anonymous, another donor, Jim Falbo, Mechatronics and Electronics Engineering Technology Program Coordinator and Instructor, shared some of the motivations behind his decision.

### Q: What inspired you to consider making an estate gift to Southwestern Community College?

A: SCC has given me more than it will ever know. I live where I want to (in the mountains), I am doing my hobby (robotics) and my passion (education) to make a living. It is truly something I am thankful for every drive into work. So, I decided to give back.

#### Q: What is your vision for your gift?

A: To hopefully help future students achieve a career they will love as much as I do mine.

### Q: Once you decided you wanted to plan an estate gift, what steps did you take?

A: My first step was to update my will with these details, (which cost) \$65 on LegalZoom.com. Then I contacted Brett Woods to see what kind of paperwork was needed.

(Editor's note: The SCC paperwork is a single page and simply signals your commitment and desire for the use of the funds when they are realized.)

Q: How long did it take?
A: About an hour.

A: Most people are not comfortable making changes like this in their will, but I can share that the plans are flexible and can be changed if circumstances dictate.

#### Entegra's matching offer yields \$22,000 for Student Success

Considering Southwestern Community College launched its Student Success Campaign with a challenge grant a few years ago, it seemed appropriate that another matching offer recently allowed SCC to close in on the campaign's \$1 million goal.

Entegra Bank recently offered to match up to \$10,000 in gifts to the campaign, and the SCC Foundation quickly found a group of donors who fully leveraged the match and pushed the most-ambitious fundraising effort in school history to within \$53,000 of the seven-figure milestone.

Including the \$10,000 matching gift, Entegra Bank has now contributed more than \$68,000 to the Student Success Campaign.

"We have a number of employees who graduated from Southwestern Community College, and we recognize the value SCC brings to our community," said Roger Plemens, Entegra Bank's president and chief executive officer. "We are always eager to support the SCC Foundation and its efforts to make a college education available to as many deserving students as possible."

Stepping up almost immediately to help maximize the match was Pepsi Cola of Whittier, which gave \$6,000 toward the effort. Allison Outdoor Advertising, Inc., gave \$2,000, and Leo James donated \$1,000 to the effort. Debora and Michael Lindsay of Epic West in Bryson City added \$3,000 to help SCC get closer to its goal of providing scholarship assistance to more students than ever before.

"Every year, hundreds of high-potential students reach out to our SCC Foundation for scholarship funding," said Dr. Don Tomas, president of SCC. "We typically are only able to assist roughly 25 percent of those who qualify for scholarships. Thanks to the generosity of Entegra, Pepsi, Epic

West, Leo James, Allison Outdoor and all of our other donors, we are working hard to change that."

#### Awarded 2017-2018 Scholarships by the Numbers

- The Foundation awarded 69 scholarships, totaling \$110,000
- Of those, 50 scholarships totaling \$90,250 were from endowed scholarships.
- Twenty-one of the 69 scholarships, totaling \$48,975, were from estate gifts.
- 284 students applied for scholarships.

## Dr. Graham uses mini-grant to shine spotlight on Educational Opportunities students

Dr. Patricia Graham knows what it takes to navigate the path of education path and she is dedicated to helping her students do the same.

A 2005 SCC graduate, Graham holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Western Carolina University as well as a doctorate from Capella University. She now serves as an Educational Opportunities instructor.

This year, Graham received a mini-grant from SCC's Foundation. The grant's purpose is to "support creativity, encourage innovation and foster the exploration of new ideas." Graham's project is Through Their Eyes: The Quill Took Flight, an anthology of short works written by students enrolled in the Educational Opportunities Program on SCC's Sylva campus.

Graham's students include native English speakers and second language learners. Writing is a powerful tool to teach effective communication skills, which employers look for when hiring. Being published is also a way for students to feel validated. Graham said many of her ESL and GED students do not receive the same recognition as other students, so the book is one way to show case their abilities.

Approximately 25 students submitted entries of poetry, fiction, and non-fiction. Cultures represented include: Gujarati, Chinese, Viet-



namese, Spanish, Arabic, Thai, and English. The book is scheduled for purchase beginning mid-late August, 2017 through, among others, Amazon, Barnes and Noble and City Lights Bookstore.

The book's cover contains the image of a bright Phoenix rising. As Graham wrote in her cover explanation, "Like a phoenix rising from the fire, so are our students at Southwestern Community College...We would like to see all of our students fulfill the potential of becoming a new, vibrant phoenix by challenging all expectations placed upon them, whether this be in society, economically, or academically."

## Faculty & staff support of Foundation reaches record levels

Faculty and staff support of the SCC Foundation has made a tremendous impact on student success at Southwestern. Forty-three employees in 2016 donated using payroll deduction, which was a 125-percent increase from the prior year, while the amount contributed by payroll deduction also increased 70 percent, from \$7,344 to \$12,500.
