REGISTRATION FEES

Registration fees are due at the time of registration. Students are not enrolled until all registration fees are paid. Registration fees, supplies fees, technology fees, insurance fees, and book fees, if required, are listed with each course listing.

ELIGIBILITY

Admission is open to adults who are at least 18 years old and who are not enrolled in public school. 16 to 18-year-olds may enroll in some courses, when space is available and pending proper permission. Students under 18 years of age may enroll in summer classes specifically for the younger student. Only individuals who have registered and paid may attend class.

CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDIT

For occupational extension classes, Continuing Education Units (CEUs) are allowed. One CEU may be given for each 10 contact hours of participation in class.

REFUND POLICY

Registration fee refunds are granted only under the following circumstances:

- A student who officially withdraws from an extension class(es) prior to the first class meeting shall be eligible for a 100 percent refund. Also, a student is eligible for a 100-percent refund if an applicable class fails to "make" due to insufficient enrollment.
- After the respective class begins a 75-percent refund shall be made upon the request of the student if the student officially withdraws from the class prior to or on the 10-percent point of the scheduled hours of the class. Note: This rule is applicable regardless of the number of times the class meets or the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet.
- A 100-percent refund shall be made if the student officially withdraws from a contact hour class prior to the first day of class of the academic semester or term of if the college cancels the class. A 75-percent refund shall

be made if the student officially withdraws from a contact hour class on or before the tenth calendar day of the class.

Self-supporting classes are not eligible for refunds.

SCC's Project SEARCH 2016 Interns



SEARCH® interns, you can't help but smile when you look around and see their beaming faces as they end their daily classroom time with Devonne Jimison, SCC's Project SEARCH® coordinator and head out to their internships.

Project SEARCH® is a national non-profit program which partners with businesses to create internships for young adults with disabilities.

Three years ago, SCC partnered with Harris Regional Hospital to bring the program to Jackson County.

The program, now in its third year in Jackson County, allows men and women ages 18-30 with disabilities to gain marketable and transferrable employability skills through the implementation of hands-on work experience during a series of three separate, 10-week internships matched to their individual interests, strengths, and abilities.

"What I love about this program is that there is a lot of freedom in accepting a diverse group of young people," said Jimison. "As teachers, job coaches and counselors, we focus on each person individually and embrace who they are on their specific journey."

This program allows students with a vast range of disabilities to transition from school into a work environment.

"From the starting point, we help them identify their goals, we make a plan and we begin work on making their

dreams come true," said Jimison. "The basic dream for all of them is employment and giving back to their community."

Jimison believes this program offers hope for parents and caregivers when they see how diverse the interns in the Project SEARCH® program are. The range this year is from a student with down syndrome and a language barrier to a high-functioning student with autism, who also holds an additional job outside of the internship.

When asked what kind of impact this program has had on their lives, those beaming faces sitting across the table got even brighter when talking about what Project SEARCH® has done for them.

"This program helps you focus more on your abilities than your disabilities," said Charlotte Hill, an intern from Whittier, whose future goals include being a chef.

"This program inspires people with disabilities and benefits us by helping us get a job in the community," said Elliott Jacques an intern from Sylva.

SCC's partners in providing the program locally include Harris Regional Hospital, Vahyah Health (formerly known as Smoky Mountain Center), Vocational Rehabilitation and Webster Enterprises.

SCC/Harrah's Table Gaming School Helps Students Find Stable, Well-Paying Jobs

ot long after earning a bachelor's degree in history, Jake Roper was looking for a job.

Instead, he found a new career.

Friends mentioned that table-game dealers at Harrah's Cherokee Casino Resort get to have fun, meet new people and make good money. So Roper enrolled in Southwestern Community College's table-gaming school to learn how to become a blackjack dealer.

Within three months, he was making a good living in a stable job at Harrah's.

"I'm making more than I would have as a history teacher, and it's a lot of fun," said Roper, who's 27 and lives in Sylva. "There's a lot of opportunity for advancement, too."

Roper's story is certainly not unique. Since Harrah's first introduced table games in Cherokee four years ago, more than 1,000 students have come through the SCC Harrah's Table Gaming School.

Some were recently laid off from a new job; others were looking for a new career path.

"Southwestern Community College is all about changing lives," said Dr. Don Tomas, SCC president. "This is just one of many ways SCC offers hope and opportunity for our area residents to change their lives."

The table gaming school operates out of the Tribal Bingo building in Cherokee, roughly a mile down the road from the students' future employer.

In addition to blackjack, SCC also offers courses in craps, roulette, baccarat and poker.

"It's a great option for anyone who enjoys being around people in a high-energy environment," said Scott Sutton, SCC's director of occupational training. "For a very small investment of time and money, you can learn all the skills you need for a promising future in the table gaming industry."

All instructors in SCC's program are either shift managers or table gaming supervisors who ensure that students not only learn the games but also what is expected from them at the casino.

One such instructor is Harrah's shift manager Jeff Maier, who's been

in the industry for 33 years. He said some schools across the country charge \$3,000 or more to teach the same courses Southwestern offers for less than \$200.

"As you develop skills in multiple games, it allows you the opportunity for advancement within the company," Maier said. "Harrah's has casinos around the world."

Brooks Robinson, who is the general manager for Harrah's Cherokee Casino Resort, said SCC helped fill a crucial need.

"As we've continued to grow and expand our operations in this region, having a partner like SCC has been vital in developing workforce training for our table games," Robinson said. "By working with Southwestern, we're able to employ workers who already live right here in Western North Carolina. Even beyond our partnership, I know through my work with the SCC Foundation that Southwestern Community College has a tremendous impact on the lives of countless people in this region."

The facility is primarily dedicated to coordinating Public Safety Training Programs (EMS, Fire/Rescue, and Law Enforcement) to all agencies within the SCC service area and beyond. EMERGENCY MEDICAL SERVICES

The PSTC EMS program offers courses for initial certification for all levels of EMS Professionals. We also offer continuing education and refresher courses to maintain professional certifications. We are an American Heart Association training center and provide CPR and First Aid training to both health-care professionals as well as the general public. We offer several specialty courses for both pre-hospital and in-hospital medical professionals. EMS 4300 AEMT: (292 hrs.) The primary focus of the Advanced Emergency Medical Technician is to provide basic and limited advanced emergency medical care and transportation for critical and emergent patients who access the emergency medical system.

EMS 3010 BLS for Healthcare Providers: (6 hrs.) This course is for healthcare professionals who need to know how to perform CPR, as well as other lifesaving skills, in a wide variety of in-hospital and out-of-hospital settings. PSTC F 1/26/2016 08:30-15:30

EMS 3016 Heartsaver CPR, AED & First Aid: (6 hrs.) This course is for anyone with limited or no medical training who needs a course completion card in first aid, CPR and AED use to meet job, regulatory or other requirements.

EMS 3200 Law Enforcement First Response Tactical Casualty Care: (8 hrs.) LEFR-TCC teaches public safety first responders including police, other law enforcement officers, firefighters, and other first responders the basic medical care interventions that will help save an injured responder's life until EMS practitioners can safely enter a tactical scene.

EMS 3041 Tactical Emergency Casualty Care (TECC) Course: (16 hrs.) Designed for EMS practitioners needing tactical casualty care training for the civilian sector and meets all Tactical Emergency Casualty Care guidelines. Call for more information.

EMS 3050 EMT-Paramedic to Paramedic Transition Course: (48 hrs.) Course will provide a state approved EMT-Paramedic to Paramedic transition course to bridge

currently credentialed EMT Paramedics trained under the old DOT National Standard Curriculum to the new Education Standards.

EMS 3041 Pre-Hospital Trauma Life Support (PHTLS): (16 hrs.) This course will give additional training in the handling of trauma patients. It is designed to enhance and increase knowledge and skill in delivering critical care in the pre hospital environment.

EMS 3041 Advanced Medical Life Support: (16 hrs.) EMS education program that addresses how to best assess and manage the most common medical crises in patients, offering a "think outside the box" methodology. The course offers an initial assessment-based approach that progresses to a diagnostic-based approach to quickly develop the best treatment plan.

EMS-4100 Emergency Medical Responder: (72 hrs.) The primary focus of the Emergency Medical Responder is to initiate immediate lifesaving care to critical patients who access the emergency medical system.

EMS-4200 Emergency Medical Technician - Hybrid Course: (248 hrs.) The primary focus of the Emergency Medical Technician is to provide basic emergency medical care and transportation for critical and emergent patients who access the emergency medical system.

FIRE AND RESCUE

Various courses are offered in cooperation with individual fire and rescue departments in the Jackson County, Macon County, Swain County and Qualla Boundary service area. Specific courses are designed to increase the firefighter's technical knowledge and improve his or her skills in fire ground operation. Classes may be offered according to the needs of each fire department. In addition, SCC offers the nationally recognized fire-fighter certification program and the rescue certification program. The training curriculum is based on the NFPA 1001 & NFPA 1006 standards. The Fire and Rescue Training Facility is located adjacent to the Public Safety Training Complex at 225 Industrial Park Loop, Franklin, NC 28734. This 4,100 square foot, three-story live burn building is designated for a variety of training exercises. Both fire and smoke exercises can be conducted in and on the structure and rescue operations can be simulated throughout the building. FIP 3000: Firefighter 1&2 Academy: (458 hrs.) This State accredited program is designed to prepare entry level individuals with the cognitive and physical skills to become certified

fire fighters. The course is comprised of thirty-two separate blocks of instruction. The Fire Academy, upon completion, will enable the graduate to be certified to work as a Fire Fighter in the State of North Carolina as well as work with the USFS as a Wildland Fire Fighter level II and will also qualify the candidate to work as a fire fighter in any IFSAC or Pro-Board Compliant state pending completion of the Fire Fighter certification test which will be administered at the conclusion of training as part of the Academy.

FIP 3001: Orientation & Safety: (16 hrs.) This course will enable the firefighter candidate to become aware of the advanced operations of the department and understand their position in the organization from a more detailed perspective.

FIP 3003: Alarms & Communications: (16 hrs.) This course is designed to teach the firefighter candidates the policies and procedures concerning the ordering and transmitting of emergency alarms and the actions to be taken upon receipt of the alarms.

FIP 3006: Personal Protective Equipment: (20 hrs.) This class will present the firefighter with the function of each article of protective equipment, the leading cause of death of firefighters, and the hazardous environment requiring the use of protective equipment. Information will cover use, maintenance, donning, care and handling of SCBA.

FIP 3007: Forcible Entry: (14 hrs.) This course is designed to demonstrate methods of forcing entry into structures utilizing different principles and practices.

FIP 3008: Ventilation: (20 hrs.) This course is designed to teach the candidate different methods of performing safe and effective ventilation principles and practices.

FIP 3010: Ladders: (16 hrs.) This course is designed to teach the candidate all aspects of ladder safety including, carrying, raising, lowering, climbing, and operating from fire service ladders.

FIP 3011: Fire Hose, Streams and Appliances: (19 hrs.) This course will provide the firefighter candidate with the opportunity to demonstrate the use of hose, nozzles, adaptors, and appliances, and to obtain the information needed to conduct an annual service test of fire hose.

FIP 3018: Water Supplies: (20 hrs.) This course is designed to teach the candidate the methods of moving water from a source to an emergency scene, as well as to teach the basic components of a local water distribution system.

FIP 3019: Sprinklers: (17 hrs.) This course covers the various types of sprinkler systems, as well as their components and the reliability of automatic sprinkler systems.

FIP 3021: Fire & Life Safety Preparedness: (12 hrs.) This course is designed to assist the candidate in all functions of a fire and life safety program: inspections, prevention, education, and cause determination.

FIP 3022: Building Construction: (16 hrs.) This course will enable the firefighter candidate to identify the different types of construction and their reaction during a fire situation and the hazards associated with each.

FIP 3025: Safety & Survival: (16 hrs.) This class will show firefighters how to overcome the stressful environments during fire and rescue operations they may encounter. Firefighters will get a better understanding of what to expect in a stressful environment such as: out of air emergency, lost or disoriented firefighters, rescuing a down firefighter, SCBA limitations, navigating confined spaces with SCBA, rescuing fire victims and self-survival techniques.



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
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
